Caritas Internationalis invites you to join us in our second annual week of prayer and action to jointly mark the World Day of the Poor (13 November) and World Youth Day (20 November). Caritas Youth from all regions of the Confederation have created – and will animate – this year's program.

The program is inspired by Pope Francis' messages for this year's World Day of the Poor 'For your sakes Christ became poor' (2 Cor 8:9) and World Youth Day 'Mary arose and went with haste' (Luke 1:39).

'Beginning on the World Day of the Poor and ending on World Youth Day, you will be guided through a series of daily prayers, reflections and actions that follow the 'See, Judge, Act' Methodology.'

Throughout the week, the metaphor of planting and nurturing a tree will inspire the evolution of our reflections and actions and will help you to also connect with Caritas Internationalis' ongoing global campaign, *Together We*.

The goal is to inspire in all who participate an openness to being evangelized by the poor, and to help us to discover new and innovative ways to serve, accompany and defend the most vulnerable – in other words, to truly be with them.

We invite anyone and everyone to join us, and we hope that you will use this initiative to enter into dialogue and encounter with your wider community!

Prepare the ground

Sunday 13 November the World Day of the Poor

Before a seed can go into the ground, it is essential that the environment where the tree will grow is properly prepared. This could involve ensuring that the soil is healthy enough to receive and nurture the seed, or clearing the area so that the tree has enough room to grow. In the same way, today let's prepare ourselves for our reflections and actions for the week ahead. Choose your seed Monday 14 November

Now that our environment is ready to nurture a growing tree, it is important to consider just what type of seed we should plant. Today, let's reflect on what types of actions are most appropriate to engage with the poor in our own community.



What do you see others currently doing in your community to serve the poor? What opportunities exist that you would like to get involved in?



St. Paul tells us, 'For your sakes Christ became poor' (2 Cor 8:9). What do you think St. Paul means by 'poverty' in this sense? Can this type of poverty counteract the type of poverty that causes so many in our communities to suffer?



Choose one thing in your life that prevents you from becoming 'poor' in the same way that Jesus became poor. Try to go without it until Sunday. On Sunday decide, can you do away with it for good?

Throughout its entire life, a tree is inextricably interconnected with the environment around it.

When you experience changes in your own life or in your community, does this affect your openness towards the poor and how you treat them?



Have a conversation with someone who has been affected by a crisis: ask them about their journey to where they are today, and truly listen to how they have struggled.

In doing so, remember the words of Pope Francis in his 2022 World Youth Day Message: "In this beautiful season of your lives, press ahead and do not postpone all the good that the Holy Spirit can accomplish in you!"
